The following dress code, electronic device policy, and security measures for the Tohono O'odham Judicial Court was adopted on September 26, 2022, is effective on October 1, 2022, and applies to all persons entering the Judicial Court buildings, to include the Adult Probation and Children's Program buildings.

In order to show respect to the Court and Judges, this policy addresses expected conduct and appropriate dress while within the Judicial Court buildings. Those deemed by Court staff to be in violation of this Order will be asked to leave.

It is **ORDERED** that everyone who enters the Justice Center of the Nation – whether legal counsel, tribal advocate, party, witness, juror, or spectator – be dressed appropriately so as to maintain the dignity, integrity, decorum, seriousness, and professional atmosphere of the Court. Legal practitioners should dress in business or business casual, wear close-toed shoes or dress shoes, and have a neat overall appearance, including hairstyle. For men, this means slacks or khakis and a collared shirt, ideally with a tie or suit jacket. For women, this means a dress (no more than 2 inches above the knees), pair of pants or a skirt (no more than

¹ Business casual attire is broadly defined as a code of dress that blends traditional business wear with a more relaxed style that's still professional and appropriate for an office environment.

The following are prohibited while inside a courtroom:

- Food, drinks, or gum chewing.
- Wearing of hats or caps, with exceptions for appropriate religious or medical reasons.

It is further **ORDERED** that cell phones are not allowed to be used in the courtroom with the exception of case-related research for attorneys, advocates, spokespersons, and service providers (i.e., child welfare workers), who must ensure that any usage is quiet and not distracting or disturbing to anyone else. Cell phones and other electronic devices should be placed in silent mode upon entering the building. Recording audio/video or taking photos while in the Court building is also prohibited. At their discretion and for good cause, Judges may allow any of these devices.

This Order hereby supersedes and rescinds any and all conflicting procedures and is effective October 1, 2022.
